Navigating Uncertainties on the Korean Peninsula: Coordinating U.S. & Japanese Approaches

Presentation and Public Seminar in Tokyo – Simultaneous Interpretation Provided

When President Trump and Prime Minister Abe met in New York last month, they agreed that continued provocations from North Korea constitute an “unprecedented and grave threat to international peace.” The two leaders committed to working with other countries to ensure full implementation of United Nations Security Council sanctions and to pursuing other efforts to maximize pressure on North Korea. Those efforts are expected to be a focus of their early November meeting in Tokyo as well as their discussions with regional leaders at the U.S.-ASEAN summit and East Asia Summit in Manila later in the month. In the lead-up to these important discussions, the Mansfield Foundation is convening a panel of experts to present their perspectives on the threat from North Korea and to examine ways Japan can work with South Korea and the United States to manage this threat.

Katsuyuki Kawai, Member, House of Representatives of Japan

Mr. Kawai, a member of the House of Representatives in the Diet of Japan, also serves as Special Advisor for Foreign Affairs to Prime Minister Shinzo Abe. Mr. Kawai previously served as Parliamentary Secretary of Foreign Affairs under Prime Minister Koizumi, and was reappointed again in 2005. Mr. Kawai is a graduate of Keio University and is currently in his 7th term as representative of Hiroshima's 3rd District.



Frank Jannuzi, President & CEO, Maureen and Mike Mansfield Foundation

Mr. Jannuzi joined the Mansfield Foundation as President and Chief Executive Officer in April 2014. He previously served as Deputy Executive Director (Advocacy, Policy and Research) at Amnesty International, USA. There he shaped and promoted legislation and policies to advance universal human rights, protect individuals and communities at risk, and free prisoners of conscience. From 1997-2012 Mr. Jannuzi was Policy Director, East Asian and Pacific Affairs, for the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Committee, where he advised Committee Chairmen Joseph Biden and John Kerry on a range of security, political, economic, and human rights issues pertinent to U.S. relations with East Asia. During his tenure with the Foreign Relations Committee he also was a Hitachi Fellow of the Council on Foreign Relations from 2006-2007, serving as a visiting lecturer at Keio University and a visiting scholar at the Institute of International Policy Studies in Tokyo. Early in his career he served for nine years as an analyst in the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Intelligence and Research. Mr. Jannuzi holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Yale University and Master in Public Policy degree from the John F. Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University.



Atsuhito Isozaki, Associate Professor, Keio University

Dr. Isozaki's research focuses on contemporary North Korean politics. Previously, he served as a special analyst on North Korean politics in the Intelligence and Analysis Service of the Japanese Ministry of Foreign Affairs and was a senior researcher on North Korean politics at the Japanese Embassy in Beijing. In addition to this, he was selected as a Japan Scholar at the Woodrow Wilson Center's Asia Program and a visiting scholar at the George Washington University Sigur Center. His major publications include Understanding the North Korean Regime (Woodrow Wilson Center, 2017) and New Introduction to North Korean Studies (2017, coauthored with Katsumi Sawada).



Junya Nishino, Professor, Department of Political Science, Keio University

Dr. Nishino is a Professor in the Department of Political Science at the Keio University Faculty of Law and Politics in Tokyo. He also serves as Director of the Center for Contemporary Korean Studies at Keio University. His research focuses on contemporary Korean politics, international relations in East Asia and Japan-Korea relations. Dr. Nishino was a Japan Scholar at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars and a Visiting Scholar at the George Washington University Sigur Center for Asian Studies from 2012-2013. He was also an Exchange Scholar at the Harvard-Yenching Institute in 2011-2012. Previously he served as a Special Analyst on Korean Affairs in the Intelligence and Analysis Service of the Japanese Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 2006-2007, and he was a Special Assistant on Korean Politics at the Japanese Embassy in Seoul from 2002-2004. Dr. Nishino received his B.A. and M.A. from Keio University, and Ph.D. in Political Science from Yonsei University in South Korea.



Sue Mi Terry, Senior Fellow for Korea, Center for Strategic and International Studies

Sue Mi Terry is the Senior Fellow for Korea at the Center for Strategic and International Studies and a senior advisor to Bower Group Asia. Previously, she was Senior Research Scholar at Columbia University's Weatherhead East Asian Institute (2011-2015) and the National Intelligence Fellow in the David Rockefeller Studies Program at the Council on Foreign Relations in New York (2010-2011). From 2009-2010, she was the Deputy National Intelligence Officer for East Asia at the National Intelligence Council. In 2008-2009 she served as Director for Korea, Japan, and Oceanic Affairs at the National Security Council under both Presidents George W. Bush and Barack Obama. In that role, she formulated, coordinated, and implemented U.S. government policy on Korea and Japan, as well as Australia, New Zealand, and Oceania. Earlier in her career, she served as a Senior Analyst on Korean issues at the Central Intelligence Agency (2001-2008). Sue is a frequent commentator on television and radio programs, including CNN, NBC, MSNBC, BBC, PBS, Fox News, Bloomberg, National Public Radio, Voice of America, and Radio Free Asia. She holds a Ph.D. (2001) and a Masters of Arts (1998) in international relations from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tufts University, and Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from New York University (1993). She was born in Seoul and raised in Hawaii and Northern Virginia.
